Saskatoon Tournament

Danny Ridder won the tournament with 6313 points, followed by Dinah Kunst (5971) in second place. Third place was Kristina Huisman with 5749 points.




Now we also know why Danny likes to win...

Red Deer Tournament

A bit of a tradition has established itself with Red Deer following Saskatoon, so it is no surprise that the following weekend, Skat players assembled in Central Alberta to compete. Red Deer enjoyed 32 players with one player coming from as far as Germany. While in Saskatoon, the team was drawn randomly after

assigning eight team captains, Red Deer did allow for teams to form themselves, as Red Deer was chosen to be the Alberta tournament of 2024. As a result, Red Deer chose to draw a Random Tandem, where all players paid in, and the tandem partners were chosen by drawing out of the ice bucket.

After the five rounds, Kurt Wehr was crowned the 2024 Red Deer champion. Kurt enjoyed a significant number of horseshoes on his way to this title with 6556 points, passing the likes of Danny (2nd place, 6389 points) and Rolf Naumann from Germany (3rd place, 6286 points).



With the Red Deer tournament also having been declared the Alberta Championship, Kurt is also the 2024 Alberta Skat Champion:



After an admiring pin winning victory dance from Danny, a brief announcement of Ron was overheard, stating: Oh well, I am fourth then. This was disproven by the editor pipping Ron's score by five points. A score review

can certainly be provided, Ron, with the contribution of a small administration fee (3).

The 2024 Alberta Team Championship went to "The Professors and Maryanne", the team formed by Michael Buro, Ron Link, Kristina Huisman and David McLaughlin. Total combined score of 19858 points.



These four did not have the combined highest team score however, but the highest team score contained Rolf Naumann, a non-Albertan, which made them ineligible for the Alberta Teams trophy. Here the winning team with 23799 points.





The Random Tandem competition was won by Danny and Gerd with a combined 12366 points:



Finally, Red Deer also produced two pin winners: Monika Belanger (Bronze) and Danny for his fourth Gold:

Edmonton Tournament

42 players assembled in Edmonton for the annual ISPA tournament with players traveling from Omaha, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary and Red Deer, besides the 25 players from Alberta's capital. Needless to say, the computer was not able to set the tables apart by clubs with such an imbalance of club representation. Edmonton's start time of 6pm for the Friday warmup made it really tough for the remote working folks to be on time, the scorekeeper included. Perhaps this start time should be reviewed for next year.

As for the main tournament, the traditional tardiness of one player created rework, Edmonton needs to seriously consider abiding by a pre-defined registration closure time 30 minutes before the set start time in the future. Actually, all clubs should have a registration closure of 30 minutes before start time.

After five rounds in an increasingly hot room due to lack of air conditioning, Ron Link emerged as the winner of the tournament with 6316 points, followed by Ottawa's Scott McCormick (5864) and Kristina Huisman (5792). The team competition was won by Skatlink with 22606 points. Congratulations to all winners!

Willi further writes us this:

We now have played now in our 2024 season 25 times, so I like to highlight two issues:

On the GOOD side: Fred Reinke, having played each of our 25 games will now start to improve his "Running 25 weeks Ave." with his next-week's task being replacing his present lowest score of 720 by a higher number thus improving that score. A lower score will not change his present one. So, to all, don't forget, the more often you play, the better your chance for a higher year-end standing. Just for your information: This rule setup, basically to entice people to play more often, was invented by Bernd Erbrecht when he was president of the TOR club, – may he rest in peace –, who was one of the best Canadian Skat Players. It was immediately adopted by HAM.

It forced me to develop our workbook as calculating this score would have been too work-intensive and error-prone to do manually.

On the POOR side: We have 4 members who have not yet played the minimum number of games needed to receive a year-end prize, noting 1,2,3 & 4 games only having been played. ... I know the "4-games" player spends most of her time now on Vancouver Island, preventing participation, but I believe the other 3 are in Hamilton. Come on; we love you to come and play. Your next drink is on me!
